In the early years of experimental psychology, they were reports of "brighter" or "heavier" or other estimates of the magnitude of differences between the sensory stimuli presented in psychophysical experiments. Introspective accounts of the experience of seeing colored lights or shapes were important sources of psychological data in the laboratories of Cornell,

Harvard, Leipzig, or Würzburg around the turn of the century. In 1910, John B. Watson called for the objectification of psychological research, even parodying the typical subjective introspective reports that emerged from Edward Bradford Titchener's laboratory. For almost fifty years psychologists largely eschewed subjective information and turned their attention to observable behavior. Rats running mazes or pigeons pecking away on varied schedules of reinforcement became the scientific prototypes for those psychologists who viewed themselves as "doing science." For the psychologists, questionnaires and projective tests that allowed for quantitative analysis and psychometrics seemed to circumvent the problem of subjectivity. Sigmund Freud's introduction of free association became the basis for psychoanalysis as a therapy and as a means of learning about human psychology. Slips-of-the-tongue, thought intrusions, fantasies, hesitations, and sudden emotional expressions became the data employed by
